MANDATORY ASSESSMENT DEMONSTRATION PROGRAM P.L. 2013 CH. 15

The primary purpose of the program is to demonstrate a more cost effective and accurate process of property assessment administration for New Jersey.

There are five primary components: Assessment Standardization, Calendar Changes, Annual Reassessment Assessment, Inspection Cycle, Education, Legislative Refinement.

The following analysis illustrates the estimated cost saving over a 10 year period:

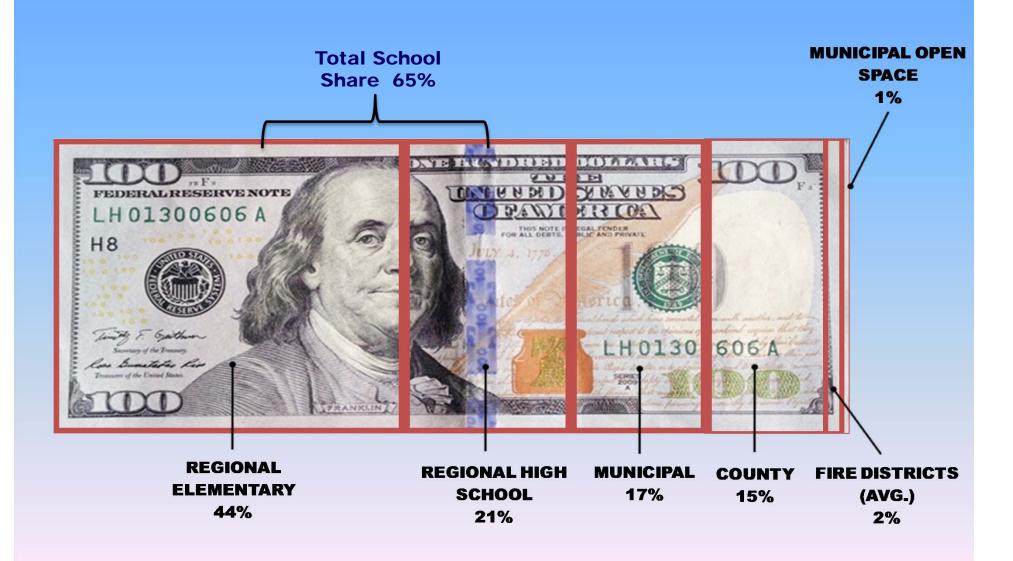
