Bird Flu or Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) H5N1

What is the current situation with Bird Flu?

- "Bird flu" or Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) H5N1, is a disease primarily affecting wild birds but can affect domesticated poultry and dairy cows.
- It is widespread in wild birds worldwide and is causing outbreaks in poultry and U.S. dairy cows.
- No person-to-person spread of bird flu has been documented in the US.
- While the risk to humans is low, precautions are important, especially for those near poultry farms or with backyard chickens.
- In NJ, there have been recent detections in wild birds.

Who is at risk of Bird Flu?

• Most human cases of bird flu involve occupational (work-related) and recreational (hobby-related) exposure to birds, poultry and/or dairy cows.

What should I do if I find sick or dead wild birds?

• **Do not** touch or handle sick or dead wild birds. Residents should report it immediately to the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection Hotline at **1-877-WARNDEP** (877-927-6337).

What should I do if I see unusual illness or deaths among my domestic birds or livestock?
